Dearest loved ones.

Our vision at Holy Trinity has shifted a bit since July. Our Council has highlighted that our vision is now: BEING A DIFFERENCE- seeking, partnering, responding. This month, I share a sermon from October 27th. Sorry for the length but I do believe this will help in seeing just how committed we are to inviting a different way to be in this world.

Grace and peace to you from our Lord and Savior, Jesus the Christ. The one who invites us to still water. And from the Holy Spirit who urges us to move toward that water. Amen

For those who are newer to this community, on Reformation Sunday in 2017, I led a worship service which was turned upside down. We began that service by singing a hymn and then jumped right into celebrating the Eucharist. This idea came to me in prayer probably because I am a rebel rouser. I mean, everyone knows that our tradition says we must have confession and absolution before we can eat of the body and drink of the blood. Oh wait, perhaps the idea came in prayer for it was Reformation Sunday- the day we celebrate discovering the invitation to life and the freeing of tradition and dogma and orthodoxy.

While we are experiencing this service in a traditional ordo, that word means the ranks of rows on a ship. So, proper placement of all means (properly the oars) to help this boat in moving forward. In our Lutheran tradition ordo isconfession, greeting, kyrie, hymn of praise, prayer, lessons, exhortation of lesson, creed, prayers of intercession, peace, offering, Great Thanksgiving with very specific pieces of liturgy in that part of the ordo, table blessing, final blessing, sending.

This ordo was good and right for a people who were moved by tradition and familiarity, for people who see method as means, or for the pastors who were taught to never question authority. While many of those types of people still exist in our world and in our pews, a new voice, a new teaching of God and authority and order has been poking its nose in our doors here at Holy Trinity. That voice has been offering a new order of oars for they think the church has become stagnant.

Like this thought or not, we should recognize that our world has shifted greatly in the last 70 years. Faster cars, bigger buildings, greater salary and taxes, quicker upload speeds of information, greater yearning for furthered education, and new understandings of God. All of these advances, or tools of the devil depending on how you view them, have changed how we deal in our everyday lives. Therefore, why don't we shift a little in our ordo and in our wording to reflect where the culture dwells and how God is in all that dwelling. This shifting is Biblical. We heard of a great shifting in the first Kings passage just moments ago where worship shifts from a tent to a fixed structure. So, while our ordo for today is quite traditional, some of our language has shifted to invite an understanding of God- here and now, with and within us to be heard and felt by those attending worship.

Is this good and right for us? I cannot be sure. Pray upon it. Ask your children what they think of our new language. Ask them what they think of our old ordo and our old language. Because truthfully, what will keep this boat moving forward are our young people. The people who are the future, the forward. As we move into a possible reformation moment of worship practices, I promise we will keep this traditional format as long as necessary. Yet, we will allow space for new ordo, new language to be present. We will allow this by more worship experiences and times. Wednesday night spiritual worship, Sunday morning breakfast and conversation worship, Family night soup and growing worship, Council worship, Morning Glories worship, and all our gatherings seen as worship.

In today's Gospel reading, we hear of Jesus turning over the tables of the Temple. This act was done for the people in the Temple were worshiping the deities of this world. At that moment it was money. Other moments in the Bible it was correct practice, or correct words, or correct anything which kept the focus and power in the hands of the leaders instead of in the hands of God. Our goal in our mini reformation is to have the focus and power back on God who has given worship and resources to all people. We reform so others can come to know that the name of God has been invoked in their hearts and life is carried out through their hands and their voices because we reside in God and God

has built for us- life. So, as you come to Holy Trinity for an 8am spoken service, or a 9:15 relaxed service, or a 10:30 traditional service come so to gives thanks and praise. Come to empty yourself of the world and allow the Spirit to fill you with life. Come not out of obligation but out of response. Come for here we are reformed- changed in body, mind, and spirit to be a difference in a world which needs to remember God here, God now, God with and within us as life as love as future. Amen

When you make a purchase, give your card to the cashier to scan. The total points will show at the bottom of your receipt. Place your receipts in the basket in the "giving area" in the back of the sanctuary so the points can be submitted. Holy Trinity receives 1% of the purchase (excluding milk, tobacco, and tax). At \$1 for every \$100 spent, this can add up to a significant contribution toward Bear Creek camperships!

This fund is used to give temporary financial assistance to people of our congregation and community when a sudden need arises. Trinity Morning Glories

We are a daytime women's group here at Holy Trinity. Our focus is on the spiritual and service to others. Along the way, we share food, work, laugh, chat and pray together! Please join us!

Note: Our meetings will always be the 3rd Monday at 10:00 (exception: Dec. will be the 2nd Monday).

Our October 21, 2024 meeting was attended by 25 women, including guest, **Christine Hershman**, and the speaker from the Clubhouse of the Lehigh Valley, **Chris Stout**. Welcome! Once again, **Betty Henderschedt** played our opening song, "Good Morning, Lord." Thanks, Betty.

One of our newer members, **Peggy Wuertele**, led the devotions. She pointed out that we all seem to be anxious lately, whether it is from worry about natural disasters or even the election. During these times Peggy reaches for her book called "Finding Joy: 101 Ways to Free Your Spirit" by Charlotte Davis Kasl. She points out that joy brings hope and we should take time to remember good things we have done. Perhaps take a break from the news. Then she led us in a meditation that she practices. She recites the words from Psalm 46:10: "Be still and know that I am God." As she recites it again and again, she drops off the last word until it ends with "Be."

Our speaker this month was **Chris Stout** from The Clubhouse of Lehigh County. It is a place for persons recovering from mental illness and offers a safe and healing environment located at 1435 W. Gordon St., Allentown. Chris pointed out that 1 in 4 people will experience mental illness. The Clubhouse non-profit started in New York City in the 1940s. The Clubhouse of Lehigh County in Allentown was started in 1999 so this year is its 25th anniversary. There are at least 328 chapters in 30 countries worldwide, 20 in Pennsylvania alone. Allentown is slightly different because it is funded by Lehigh County. It also gets support from GoodWill. Right now, Allentown serves approx. 50 individuals regularly with about 300 active members. A person can join if there is a documented mental health issue and lifetime membership is free. Members choose their own attendance schedules and areas of participation.

Volunteer Needed: **Kathy Nattress** has asked that someone else step up to take the Morning Glories Notes in January. Update: **Ann Marie Overdorf** has volunteered to do our note taking; she will be working with Kathy for Nov/Dec notes.

Murder Mystery: The final amount, a whopping \$3,411.00, was forwarded to The Children's Home of Easton from "Murder at the Moulin Rouge," held Sept. 14! It's now time to think ahead to 2025. The members voted to continue with this fun fundraiser. **Janis Chavala** has been in touch with Without a Cue Productions. They will not have their list of 2025 shows until December but Janis will ask them to reserve September 13, 2025 for the Morning Glories. We already have 2 angels each willing to donate \$500 toward the cost of the play. More to come in December or January.

Holiday Hope Chest Boxes: This year, we have been given a choice of something new. We are assigned 9 to 12 year old boys or girls or the organization can also use \$15 to \$25 gift cards for Amazon, Target, Walmart, Five Below or Visa/Mastercard for ages 13+. Our award-winning float in the Catty parade (with our prize money gifted to the Catty School District for personal care items for students), Trunk-or-Treat with the Catty police at the playground, hot dog and cocoa giveaway on Halloween night...as well as the continuation of the FAST (Fun After School at Trinity) program and snack giveaway at the Catty playground for the middle schoolers. God, everywhere you turn!

The Five Loaves & Two Fish Team was also back in business...and will be looking for volunteers to help with upcoming events. The Chicken Marsala Dinner on October 12th raised \$1411 for the Allentown Rescue Mission. **Next up: Pancake Breakfast and Bake Sale on Saturday, November 23rd from 8:30-11am.** Arrive any time during the breakfast...no tickets needed to enjoy a delicious meal! This by-donation event benefits the Pastor's Discretionary Fund, which helps meet emergency needs of our church family and Catasauqua neighbors. Watch for "Warm-Up Wednesday" free soup nights to start the week after Thanksgiving. This isn't just for the Catasauqua community...and it isn't just for the food insecure. Think about it *THIS* way: how beautiful would it be to be together in HT's fellowship hall with our church "members" and with the Catasauqua community, sharing a meal and a friendly word, or even just sharing a quiet table? What a non-traditional worship experience *THAT* would be!

In the meantime, everyone is welcome to come out on Wednesday evenings for games, puzzles, music, karaoke...and a light supper! Come as early as 5, stay as late as 9. At the end of November, music and game night will merge with Warm-Up Wednesdays.

Beyond Catty...it's time for us to help area agencies provide a Merry Christmas to their clients/residents. The annual Mission District **Ingathering of gifts runs from Sunday, November 3rd through Sunday, December 1st.** HT is responsible for 4 gifts for individuals at KidsPeace (details to follow), 200 fruit snacks, 25 puzzle books, 35 packs of washable markers/colored pencils/crayons, \$12 to purchase journals, and \$25 towards a group gift for this year's featured agency, the Allentown Y Warming Station. The Warming Station is no stranger to HT – the youth, Morning Glories, and Five Loaves Team have all raised funds for this agency, helping to provide a safe,warm place overnight during the cold winter months. Watch for the Angel Tree in the entryway with tags for all of these needed items...plus wish lists for extra gifts for The Warming Station and Gracedale Nursing Home. Want to get personally involved in the Ingathering? Join members of the Social Ministry Team on Monday, December 2nd to sort the many gifts...and come with us on Thursday, December 5th at 10am for the big sort with our sister churches at Union Lutheran Church in Schnecksville - then stay to hear the speaker from the Warming Station, and to enjoy a delicious lunch together. Let Cheryl Kneis or Diane Czar know if you'd like to attend.

HT's FOOD SHELF...Did you know we have one? We have a number of people that your Pastor and his discretionary fund are helping...but there's another way we can help our neighbors. They often check the shelf in the hallway for needed items, and if you already put things on the shelf, thank you! There are some people who are homeless and have no refrigeration or cooking facilities, or who live in a rooming house where they only have access to a microwave. To address their specific needs, here are some suggested items: individual microwaveable items that don't need refrigeration (like individual Chef Boy-ar-dee and mac-n-cheese), peanut butter and jelly, crackers, individual servings of fruit that don't need refrigeration, bottled water, and juice boxes. Men's and women's toiletries are also welcome: shampoo, body wash, toothbrushes and toothpaste, deodorant (keep in mind that some of these neighbors are living out of backpacks, so extra-large sizes aren't practical). Can you add one or two items to your cart each time you stop at the store? Thank you for whatever you can share!

And, as always, our building's doors continue to welcome well-known and fresh faces seeking emergency assistance, help securing means to become self-sufficient, assistance preventing or resolving or living with homelessness, rides to appointments...or often just a cup of coffee and a listening ear. As one person said, "I come up because I need to be around positive people." Thank you for your continued donations to the Pastor's Discretionary Fund that help keep the financial part of this Holy Trinity service to the community a reality. Our church family continues to be blessed with surprise monetary gifts from strangers as well as from familiar sources, often accompanied by words like "Keep doing what you're doing".

Holy Trinity's SCRIP card fundraiser in a nutshell:

~The second Sunday of each month is the deadline for our regular monthly order. (Exception: December deadline is the first Sunday, to avoid holiday shipping delays.)

- ~Cards are delivered to you at church the 3rd Sunday of the month. We receive them 4 days after the order deadline. Contact Joe if you need your cards before Sunday.
- ~SCRIP profits are rolled into an inventory of the most popular cards, available for immediate purchase. The exception to this is when there is a faith formation-related expense to pay, or a Paul Frantz scholarship to be awarded. SCRIP profits have also benefited Numan Orphanage in Ethiopia and the Pastor's Discretionary Fund in the past. What better faith formation act than living out Jesus' example of caring for someone in need?
- ~Order forms are in the back of the sanctuary and in rack in the hall just outside the church office. Contact Joe or Diane (610-739-6006) for more information or to browse the cards in stock. IOUs are welcome!

Our next order deadline is Sunday November 10th. (December's order deadline will be one week early - December 1st.) Think shopping for holiday meals/baking; Black Friday sales; Christmas shopping (including Secret Santa, employee, teacher, hairdresser, boss), as well as your regular runs for coffee, gas, groceries, prescriptions, and meals out.
